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WHY DELIGHT IN THE WORD OF GOD? Shadrack Oppong

Text: Psalm 119:33-64

Thesis: To motivate the brethren to delight in God's Word.

INTRODUCTION

- 1. The world in which we live was created and sustained by the Word that proceeded from the mouth of God (Gen. 1:3,6,9,11,14,20,24,26,29,30).
- God's Word is powerful, capable of doing every things God wants it to do (Isa. 55:11, Heb. 4:12).
- 3. Psalm 119 is unique among the songs written to praise God for His Word.
- 4. Psalm 119 is the longest Psalm with 176 verses which mainly speak on the Word of God.
- 5. This Psalm is outlined in twenty-two (22) divisions which are represented by each letter of the Hebrew alphabets.
- 6. We shall consider four of these divisions or outlines namely HE, VAU, ZAIN, CHETH representing the 5th, 6th, 7th, and 8th letters of the twenty-two Hebrew alphabets.
- 7. God's Word has been described throughout the scriptures in different ways.
- 8. This Psalm is not only unique because of its length or outline but most importantly, what it teaches.
- 9. As we study a portion of this Psalm, we shall consider four reasons why we must delight in the Word of God.
 - a. There is life in God's Word (Psa. 119:33-40).
 - b. There is mercy and salvation in God's Word (Psa. 119:41-48).
 - c. There is comfort in God's Word (Psa. 119:49-56).
 - d. There is blessing in keeping God's Word (Psa. 119:57-64).

DISCUSSION

I. THERE IS LIFE IN GOD'S WORD (Psa. 119:33-40).

- A. Because the Word of God teaches the way of life (Psa. 119:33-34).
 - 1. We need go commit to the Word of God for direction in life (Jer. 10:23).
 - 2. For the whole duty of man is to keep the commandment of God according to the wise king (Eccl. 12:13).
 - 3. We must commit to studying the Word to understanding it and keeping it (Psa. 1:1-2, Jas.1:22).
 - 4. We must commit to heart the observation of the Word and the love of God (Mat. 22:37-40; Jas. 1:8).
- B. Because the Word of God brings delight to our hearts (Psa. 119:35-37).
 - 1. The Word of God is spirit, and it is life (John 6:63).
 - 2. We must let the Word of God lead us to bear fruit (Gal. 5:22).
 - 3. We must be led by the Spirit as children of God (Rom. 8:14).
 - 4. His word will help us prevent living a life of selfishness and discontentment (Heb. 13:5; 1 Tim. 6:6-10; Psa. 119:36).
- C. Because the Word of God gives assurance and confirmation of God's promises (Psa. 119:38-40).
 - God is not slack concerning His promises, He will always come through (2 Pet. 1:3-4; 3:9).
 - God's Word confirms that all the promises of God are yes and Amen in Christ Jesus (2 Cor. 1:20).
 - There is assurance for a life of righteousness for any man that is in Christ (2 Cor. 5:17, 20).

II. THERE IS MERCY AND SALVATION IN GOD'S WORD (Psa. 119:41-48).

- A. The Word of God provides answers on the mercy and salvation we have in God (Psa. 119:41-42).
 - We have answers to everyone who ask us questions about our faith in God because of the Word of God (1 Pet. 3:15).
 - We have answers from God's Word when the devil tempts us (Mat. 4:1-11).
 - We have answers of our eternal salvation because of the Word of God (John 6:68-69).
 - 4. The Word of God provide sufficient information on the mercy of God toward our salvation (Eph. 2:1-6; Heb. 4:14-16).
- B. The Word of God proclaims liberty for those who obey in the Lord (Psa. 119:43-
 - 45).
 - 1. If God takes away His Word of truth from us, we get locked up in ignorance, hopelessness, and slavery to sin (Psa. 119:43).
 - 2. But when we know the Word of God which is truth, the truth set us free unto salvation (John 8:32).
 - 3. Therefore, the psalmist said, continuous keeping of the law of God will let a man walk in freedom (Psa. 119:44-45).
 - 4. Seeking the precepts of God will liberate us from sin and make us free indeed (John 8:34-36; 2 Pet. 2:19; Rom. 6:16-18).
- C. Obedience to the Word of God provides confidence (Psa. 119:46-48).
 - 1. The grace of God that brings salvation has appeared to all men and it teaches us to be obedient that we may live righteously (Titus 2:11-13).

- 2. If we obey the Word of God, we will stand confidence in preaching it to others with all authority (Psa. 119:46; Titus 2:14-15; Rom. 1:16-17).
- 3. We shall then abide in the Lord at His appearing with much confidence without shame (1 John 2:28).
- 4. The Word of God reveals to us the eternal purpose God has in Christ and that gives us boldness (Eph. 3:11-12).

III. THERE IS COMFORT IN GOD'S WORD (Psa. 119:49-56).

A. God's Word provides comfort through hope (Psa. 119:49-50).

- 1. Many people struggle in discomfort because they are without hope in life.
- 2. The people of God are comforted because they have hope that God will come through for them (Acts 27:19-24).
- But even if God does not come through in this present life, they are still comforted because the Word of God teaches them a hope of eternal life (Dan. 3:16-18, 7:16-20; Titus 3:5-7).
- 4. The resurrection of Jesus Christ gives us much comfort and hope because if Jesus was not raised there would have been no hope (1 Cor. 15:14-20).
- B. God's Word provides comfort because it teaches the affliction of the wicked (Psa. 119:51-54).
 - The people of God are afflicted for their righteousness, but the Lord will deliver them (Psa. 34:19)
 - The wicked will persecute us because we do not participate in their ways (2 Tim. 3:12).

- 3. But at due time, the wrath of God will be revealed against all ungodliness, avenge the sinner, and justify the just (Rom. 1:18; 12:17-21).
- If the sinner will not be punished, there would have been no motivation for the righteous, but when the judgment of God remembered, comfort is provided to remain righteous (Psa. 119:51-53).
- The Word of God comforts us and provides songs that rejoices our hearts (Psa. 119:54;1 Thess. 2:13).
- C. God's Word helps us to be identified with God and that gives us comfort (Psa. 119:55-56).
 - 1. There is nothing comforting than to know that God is on your side and that you can be identified by His name (2 Chron. 7:14-15; Psa. 33:12).
 - 2. We can be identified with Jesus who calls us His friends (John 15:13-15).
 - 3. We remember the sacrifice of the Lord by dining with Him in His kingdom because He laid His life for us (Luke 22:19; John 15:13).
 - If we keep His commandment then we are His friends and blessed are we (John 15:14, 14:15; Rev. 22:7).

IV. THERE IS BLESSING IN KEEPING GOD'S WORD (Psa. 119:57-64).

- A. God is our portion if we keep His commandments (Psa. 119:57-58).
 - Blessed is the man who shun sin and delight in the law of God (Psa. 1:1-6).
 - If God is for us, who can be against us, for His grace is abundant (Rom. 8:28-35).

- 3. If we keep His commandment, God is our portion and blessed are we (Lam. 3:24; Deut. 11:26-28).
- We shall know that we are blessed children of God if we are keepers of His Word (1 John 5:2-3).
- 5. There is blessing in abiding in the Love of God but that happens only when we keep His statutes (John 15:9-10).
- B. We must hastily turn to God's Word because human ways are sinful.
 - 1. A reflection of our own ways brings us to realize that we cannot direct our own path (Prov. 3:5-6).
 - It is not in man to direct his own affairs but God through His Word (Psa. 119:59; Jer. 10:23-24).
 - We must hurry to obey God's Word, if we want Him to hurry to bless us (Psa. 119:60; Luke 19:6; 2 Tim. 2:15).
- C. God's commandments are loving (Psa. 119:61-64).
 - 1. The works of the wicked may entice us but we must break away because of God's Word (Psa. 119:61).
 - We must give thanks to God for His righteous commandments (Psa. 119:172).
 - 3. We must have fellowship with those who obey God and keep His commandments (Psa. 119:63).
 - 4. God's Word indeed proofs that God is merciful, and His commandments are loving (Psa. 119:64).

CONCLUSION

- 1. From the portion of Psalm 119 that we have studied, we can summary into:
 - a. Psa. 119:33-40 (HE) teaches us that there is life in God's Word.
 - b. Psa. 119:41-48 (VAU) teaches about mercy and salvation in God's Word.
 - c. Psa. 119:49-56 (ZAIN) teaches us about the comfort in God's Word.
 - d. Psa. 119:57-64 (CHETH) teaches us that there is blessing in keeping God's Word.
- 2. God's Word is powerful for by it the world and everything in it were created.
- 3. We must love every word that proceeds from the mouth of God, because by it we shall live.
- 4. If there is any consolation in Christ, if any comfort of love, if any affection of the Spirit, they will be fulfilled if we meditate on the Word of God (Phil. 2:1).
